Bear Project Parent Instructions

Families, it's been fun to enjoy the artwork and unique style of our featured author and illustrator Eric Carle these past few weeks. With this project, kids get to create their own Brown Bear using a painting technique called "combing". You'll see why it's called that in a second! This technique creates an interesting texture reminiscent of Eric Carle's work.

- 1. The first thing to do is get the brown paint and brush out, though fingers work fine for this part of the application, too, but brushes are less messy.
- 2. Next, you'll need each sheet of cardstock that has parts of the bear copied onto it. Turn each sheet over so your student can't see the outlines of where to cut. It's on this side of the cardstock that s/he will apply the paint.
- 3. Your little artist can now paint each entire sheet of cardstock, from edge to edge. S/he can do this with the brush or even using a finger. Get a fair amount of paint on the cardstock so there'll be enough to move around.
- 4. Take the comb and drag in through the paint. Kids can go in different directions to make different patterns and keep doing that until they've achieved the texture/look they want. Going one way and then the other is called cross hatching.
- 5. Now, let it dry all the way so the paint won't smudge. This is a good time to take a break and maybe hunt for things of different colors in the yard, just like all the colors that are in this week's book!
- 6. After the paint is thoroughly dry, kids can turn the cardstock over and cut along the lines.
- 7. Now it's time to assemble the bear! You'll have a backing sheet to glue the pieces of the bear on. This is my favorite part of the project because it opens the discussion of how to go about building the bear. I suggest trying out different options of what piece to place first, second, next, last, etc., before actually glueing. Parents, please let your little learners articulate their thoughts aloud in this part! It's always fun to watch how little individuals approach problem solving tasks like building this bear!
- 8. The finishing touches will be made using scrap paper or black paint/marker to make the face.
- 9. Proudly display the artwork!

Proyecto de Oso-Instrucciones para padres

Familias, ha sido divertido disfrutar de la obra de arte y el estilo único de nuestro destacado autor e ilustrador Eric Carle en las últimas semanas. Con este proyecto, los niños pueden crear su propio oso cafe usando una técnica de pintura llamada "peinado". ¡Verás por qué se llama así en un segundo! Esta técnica crea una textura interesante que recuerda el trabajo de Eric Carle.

- 1. Lo primero que debe hacer es sacar la pintura cafe y el pincel, aunque los dedos también funcionan bien para esta parte de la aplicación, pero los pinceles son menos desordenados.
- A continuación, necesitará cada hoja de cartulina que tenga partes del oso copiadas. Dé la vuelta a cada hoja para que su alumno no pueda ver los contornos de dónde cortar. Es en este lado de la cartulina que aplicará la pintura.
- 3. Su pequeño artista ahora puede pintar cada hoja entera de cartulina, de borde a borde. Puede hacer esto con el pincel o incluso con un dedo. Obtenga una buena cantidad de pintura en la cartulina para que haya suficiente para moverse.
- 4. Toma el peine y arrástralo a través de la pintura. Los niños pueden ir en diferentes direcciones para hacer diferentes patrones y seguir haciéndolo hasta que hayan logrado la textura / apariencia que desean. Ir en un sentido y luego en el otro se llama sombreado cruzado.
- 5. Ahora, deja que se seque por completo para que la pintura no se manche. Este es un buen momento para tomar un descanso y tal vez buscar cosas de diferentes colores en el patio, ¡como todos los colores que están en el libro de esta semana!
- 6. Después de que la pintura esté completamente seca, los niños pueden voltear la cartulina y cortar a lo largo de las líneas.
- 7. ¡Ahora es el momento de armar el oso! Tendrás una hoja de respaldo para pegar las piezas del oso. Esta es mi parte favorita del proyecto porque abre la discusión sobre cómo construir el oso. Sugiero probar diferentes opciones de qué pieza colocar primero, segundo, siguiente, último, etc., antes de pegar. Padres, ¡dejen que sus pequeños alumnos expresen sus pensamientos en voz alta en esta parte! ¡Siempre es divertido ver cómo los pequeños individuos abordan tareas de resolución de problemas como construir este oso!
- 8. Los toques finales se harán con papel de desecho o pintura / marcador negro para hacer la cara.
- 9. ¡Muestra con orgullo la obra de arte!
